
The International Islamic University Malaysia is the manifestation of one of the major aspirations of Muslims scholars in Malaysia to have an Islamic university in Malaysia to lead the Muslim ummah in all branches of knowledge.





Garden of Knowledge and Virtue

The early history of the International Islamic University Malaysia can be traced back to 1917 when Za'ba (Zainal Abidin bin Ahmad, 1895-1973) mooted the idea of the need to establish 'one or two Big Madrasahs which deserve to be called university'. These Big Madrasahs, according to Za'ba shall embody the concept of 'two in one knowledge', referring to the integration of religious and worldly knowledge. In 1983, the idea put forward by Za'ba came into fruition with the establishment of the International Islamic University Malaysia, where integration of revealed and human knowledge has become the central underpinning of education at the University. The establishment of the International Islamic University in Malaysia in 1983, like the Islamic Bank, was undoubtedly one of the outstanding achievements in the Muslim world today that we can all feel proud of. It was a fulfilment of a long-felt need of the Muslim Community in Malaysia and in the world for a model of Islamic university education that would serve as an alternative to the dominant secular institution of higher learning which has functioned, among other things, as an agent of Westernisation and secular modernisation in Muslim countries. This new Islamic university model was based on the classical Islamic philosophy of knowledge and education which was grounded in the worldview of the Qur'an and the Sunnah of the Messenger of Allah (peace and blessings be upon him).




The establishment of the University, which was grounded on the basis of the principles and philosophy of knowledge and education, was also recommended by the First World Conference on Muslim Education held in Mecca in 1977. What follows is a brief survey of IIU's (the University was named IIU initially at the time of her establishment) philosophy, objectives and aspirations culled from official documents in order to indicate the seriousness and the gravity of the Islamic responsibility of the present and future employees of the University, in particular its policy makers and those who are entrusted with the administrative and academic leadership, as well as the students of university.

Our Philosophy

philosophy This unique of education knowledge and as First World expounded in the Conference on Islamic Education in Mecca in 1977 stresses, among other things, (a) the unity of knowledge in which the "revealed knowledge" becomes the most important component and centre of Islamic education. (b) the purpose of acquiring knowledge as a means of assisting the seeker to play the fundamental role as Allah's servant ('abd) and vicegerent (khalifah) on earth. (c) the all-embracing scope of Islamic education as the process of nurturing the cognitive, affective, spiritual and behavioural aspects of the human personality in the light of agidäh (creed), Islamic shariah (law), akhlaq (ethics).



IIUM was developed on two basic principles; that man is the servant of Allah and that man is vicegerent (Khalifah) of Allah on earth. In the philosophy of Islamic education, knowledge is an integral part of education which serves to achieve the totality of human development, both physical and spiritual. This is consistent with Allah's creation of man, the unity of his being in body and soul (jasad and ruh). In consistency with the above philosophy, the purpose of education in Islam is therefore to impart knowledge so that man could understand his position on earth, his relationship with his Creator, his role and function, and the need to achieve harmony with his being, his community and his environment. The knowledge imparted will also enable man to perform his role and function effectively. To serve its purpose as described, the scope of knowledge must be total, complete and inclusive. It should cover intellectual, spiritual and moral dimensions. It has to be integrated and unified because of the basic concept of creation the unity of being. The academic concept of the University should be characterised through inclusive and total, universal and wholistic as well as integrated and unified.


IIUM Mission and Vision

 - The main outcome of the Educational Goals is to nurture *Insan Sejahtera* (a balanced and harmonious person), equipped with useful knowledge and specialized skills, and committed to Islamic values and practices imbued with integrity, *Amanah*, *Iman*, *Akhlaq* and *Taqwa* towards the realisation of virtuous civilisation.


It introduces 30 Strategic Initiatives to be supported and implemented by KCDIOM. The IIUM Roadmap 2023-2024 will also be supported by 38 IIUM Flagships 3.0.



The Roadmap is seen as the starting block for the University to move towards her preferred IIUM 2040 futures, along the way espousing and realising the principles of the Sejahtera Academic Framework. It is designed to bring about change through the Whole Institution Transformation.

The IIUM Roadmap 2023-2024 strategy framework is made up of overlapping circles resulting in several domains. As the circle overlap, the shade of the domains colour becomes darker. The darkest shade domain shows where the circles overlap the most (i.e. humanising education).




Strategic Initiatives

IIUM Roadmap carries the strategic direction of 'Humanising Education through Maqasid Shari'ah and Sustainable Development Goals'.

Humanising education refers to the need to ensure education is values-based in an effort to nurture the balanced person, or otherwise also known as Insan Sejahtera. In other words, humanising education is about education with soul, loaded with values and wisdoms. It is about nurturing a person (hamba Allah) first, a professional second.

In the context of IIUM Roadmap, the process of humanising education in IIUM must be bounded by the principles of Maqasid Shari'ah. Meanwhile, Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) serve as the project-based platform on which education can be linked to the experiential and practical learning ecosystem, as well as to learning outcomes that are relevant and impactful to the communities, locally and globally. All these are concisely put in the Sejahtera Academic Framework, which facilitates Whole Institution Transformation (WIT).




Humanising education at IIUM requires a holistic transformation through Whole Institution Transformation consisting of:

- Integrated and comprehensive efforts from all.
- Student education is a shared responsibility of every member of the University community.
- Education is values-based and involves whole student experience, which in turn becomes transformative.
- Moving away from 4M (Manpower, Mind, Machine, Money) to focus on 4H (Heart, Humanity, High Touch, Humanising).

Education without values has no value in education

In the case of humanising education, IIUM is convinced of the importance of values in education, where Islamic values must be imbued in all aspects of the University, including its administration, academic activities, and student life. Values will help to define the ethics of IIUM community. Hence, IIUM implores that her community must not only possess the highest level of values, ethics and dedication, but also to mirror these in their daily lives and work culture.

Values in education must be taught, shared, and instilled in every IIUM student. They must understand that once they enrol into the University, they will experience education that puts values and intellectual competencies on equal importance, since humanising education, as aforementioned, is one with soul, loaded with values and wisdoms.

IIUM also believes that for values to be appreciated, students must experience them first-hand. Hence, experiential learning is key in the University's effort to inculcate values. Learning should not be limited to the classroom, but also through real-life experience and through learning by doing.

Learning should be linked to issues on the ground and within the society so that education and expertise at IIUM remain relevant. IIUM community must endeavour themselves to contributing towards resolving societal problems through sustainable development. Through this approach, not only the students and staff will have the opportunity to learn and hone real-life skills, but the community will also be benefited directly from the presence of a university in the vicinity.

Towards Rahmatan III 'Alamin

IIUM is not contented being a player only within the Islamic world. The University has set her sight higher, looking to remain relevant at the global stage and to become the beacon of centres for excellence. This means IIUM will have to be able to sift through the many scenarios and ideologies and offer them viable alternatives via the Islamic perspective. Islamisation agenda will be strengthened and pragmatic solutions will be offered to the entire world, not just Islamic nations, in tandem with Rahmatan Iil 'Alamin.

Leading the World does not only connote the need to be relevant and the champion at global stage, but also the need for IIUM to be courageous to not follow the mainstream if it does not suit or support the Vision and Mission of the University, or if it does not fall in line with the raison-d'etre of the University. However, in the spirit of Leading the World, IIUM and her community must offer better alternatives in cases where mainstream agendas are not to be followed, and that these alternatives must be supported by sound intellectual justifications.

IIUM leads the world by propagating the creation of SDG 18: Spirituality which focuses on the aspect of spirituality in sustainability. IIUM has established a University-level special task force to develop SDG 18: Spirituality and to motion it to the United Nations.



The contemporary era is marked by the rapid advance of digitalization and technological change, which have profoundly reshaped human society. Innovations such as artificial intelligence, big data, and the Internet of Things have facilitated global communication, streamlined commerce and healthcare, and redefined education. These developments have brought undeniable benefits by creating efficiency, expanding opportunities for collaboration, and breaking down barriers of time and space. Yet the same technological progress has also produced significant challenges. It has widened inequalities between those with access and those without, fostered social isolation by reducing face-to-face interaction, and encouraged the commodification of knowledge.

In higher education, these pressures have shifted institutions away from their traditional role of nurturing wisdom and values toward a model that is increasingly focused on performance market demands. indicators, and global rankings. Universities are producing graduates primarily as а workforce machines and markets, often at the cultivating of expense humane. ethical, and socially responsible individuals. This trajectory has been characterized as the WEIRD model —Westernized. Economic-centric. Industry-led, Reputation-obsessed, Dehumanizing—revealing and system that risks reducing learning to little more than technical training.

A different orientation for education is therefore essential if it is to serve both humanity and the planet in meaningful ways. Global frameworks such as the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and UNESCO's Education 2030 Agenda emphasize that education must extend beyond the provision of skills for the labor market. At its heart, education should be an instrument of equity, fairness, and inclusion, ensuring that no one is left behind regardless of background or circumstance. Such an approach reframes education as a transformative process rather than a transactional one. A constructive alternative is offered in what is called the WISER framework: Worldwide, Inclusive, Sustainable, Equitable, and Rahmatan lil 'alamin, which can be translated as mercy to all. This model calls for a shift in emphasis from the limited orientation of the 4Ms—Manpower, Mind, Machine, and Market—to a more holistic vision embodied in the 4Hs: Humanity, Heart, High-touch, and Humility. In this reorientation, the purpose of education expands beyond efficiency and technical competence to embrace compassion, empathy, humility, and justice. Instead of viewing students as future workers alone, education is envisioned as a process that nurtures whole individuals capable of responsibility toward both society and the environment.

The idea of Communiversity emerges as a framework capable of realizing this transformation. Rather than functioning as detached ivory towers, institutions of higher learning are called to become active partners with their surrounding communities. A Communiversity is conceived as a living collaboratory where knowledge is not only transmitted from the university outward but co-created with local communities in ways that directly address pressing challenges. Such a model recognizes that academic knowledge and indigenous or community-based wisdom are equally valuable, each contributing insights that lead to more sustainable and socially relevant solutions.

The Communiversity approach transforms higher education into a shared endeavor where learning extends beyond classrooms into real-world contexts, where students engage with community issues, and where universities help to foster cultural respect, civic responsibility, and innovation rooted in the lived realities of society. By positioning higher education as a collaborative force for the common good, the Communiversity represents an essential step toward embedding the principles of sustainability and equity into education. A practical illustration of the Communiversity in action can be found at the International Islamic University Malaysia (IIUM).

Since 2018, the institution has undergone a Whole Institution Transformation, followed by a Whole Community Transformation. that integrates sustainability across teaching, research, governance, and community engagement. Rather than pursuing recognition through global rankings, IIUM has drawn upon the indigenous concept of Sejahtera. which embodies holistic well-being in spiritual, intellectual, ecological, emotional, and societal dimensions. This guiding philosophy has allowed the university to realign its mission around values of balance and humanity.




Figure 3. Humanising Education through Whole Community Transformation.

A series of flagship initiatives were launched to embed the SDGs into curriculum and research, and the institution has gone further by proposing an additional eighteenth SDG: Spirituality, Values, and Culture. Thousands of students have been actively engaged in community-based projects that promote sustainability and well-being, demonstrating the practical integration of values-based learning. These initiatives have earned international recognition, including the prestigious Green Gown Award for Sustainability Institution of the Year, positioning IIUM as a global example of how higher education can lead through human-centered transformation.

The achievements at IIUM highlight the broader implications of adopting the Communiversity model. The current trajectory of digital and technological progress, if allowed to dominate unchecked, risks eroding the social and ethical dimensions of education. Market-oriented models. focused narrowly economic productivity, undermine the values of justice, equity, and compassion that education should cultivate. The pressing challenge of the twenty-first century is therefore to harmonize technological innovation with human dignity, cultural wisdom, and sustainable practices. The Communiversity offers a achieving this toward balance. path enabling universities to overcome elitism and detachment by reengaging directly with their communities. By fostering transdisciplinary collaboration, valuing multiple forms of knowledge, and addressing both local and global problems, the Communiversity establishes education as a moral and societal force.




Institutions that embrace this model are encouraged to innovate continuously, to reassess their strategies, and to adopt sustainability as a guiding principle across all dimensions of academic and community life. The aim is to cultivate graduates who are not only competent in their professional fields but who also embody empathy, humility, and responsibility toward society and the environment. Such individuals are needed to realize the goals of global sustainability and to contribute to a just and balanced world. The transformation of education into Communiversity underscores that higher learning cannot remain confined to technical or economic functions; it must also be human-centered, community-oriented, and globally responsible. Through such an orientation, education can reclaim its rightful role as a foundation for justice, compassion, and sustainable well-being for future generations.

IIUM Flagship Projects

Besides the strategic initiatives, the IIUM Roadmap is also being operationalised through the IIUM Flagships. These are high-impact initiatives or projects, run and managed by IIUM staff and students whose memberships transcend Kulliyyahs and Offices boundaries. Introduced under the IIUM Roadmap 2019-2020, IIUM Flagships have gone from strength to strength.

The IIUM Flagships has been a successful programme since its introduction in 2019 under the umbrella of the IIUM Roadmap 2019-2020. Under the roadmap, a total of 29 IIUM Flagships were established. These projects were led and participated by IIUM staff and students from various Kulliyyah/ Centre/Division/ Institute/ Office/ Mahallah (KCDIOM). Many of these projects have proved to be successful and have gone on to achieve greater heights. Some of the projects were World's First and some have set the examples for others to follow. Many of the IIUM Flagships also became the backbone in IIUM getting recognised as the RCE Greater Gombak.



Ultimately, the aim of IIUM Flagship to promote everyone to work with one another and break the silo-ed working environment has been achieved. Under the IIUM Roadmap 2021-2022, the number of IIUM Flagship projects grew to 46 from only 29 under the previous IIUM Roadmap. Recognising the impacts of IIUM Flagships in contributing to the University agendas, the IIUM Flagship projects continue as among the main initiatives to support the implementation of the Roadmap 2023-2024. A total of 48 project applications has been received and 36 projects are recommended. Based on previous IIUM Flagship performance, the University foresee the enabling activities such as the IIUM Flagships become one of the focal platforms to blend the community engagement activities with experiential learning. Thus, the IIUM Flagships has been approved by the University to become one of the strategic initiatives aimed to support the University to develop Balanced Graduates and Balanced Staff, Values Creation, Sejahtera Society and Institutional Stability, as described in the IIUM Roadmap 2023-2024.

With the setting up of the endowment fund amounting to AED2.5 million (MYR2.8 million), 50% of the return from the endowment will be allocated to the "Noor-IliBF Ummatic Scholarship in Islamic Banking and Finance", to pay for the tuition fees of students enrolled in the postgraduate programmes offered by IliBF.

IIUM Flagship 'YSM Agropreneuers' project, also received the Highly Commended recognition under the Benefitting Society category. The project addresses the socio-economic gap between community members by providing opportunities for youth from B40 families and single mothers to empower themselves through sustainable agricultural activities. The project provides training to participants to develop skills in growing organic vegetables and herbs, which are then sold to generate income.

mKitchen









mKitchen, or Masjid Kitchen, is a joint venture between IIUM and mosques to strengthen the economic well-being of B40 participants through food entrepreneurship.

mKitchen also runs soup kitchen and training and consultation to foodpreneurs.

Masjid Al-Syakirin Gombak was the first mosque that collaborated with mKitchen to open up a Rumah Makan mKitchen.

mKitchen also work with IIUM students in training them to become foodpreneurs.

mKitchen prepared the dining event for Her Majesty the Constitutional Head during the launching of the Vila Arah MAKNA on 20th March 2023.

HIKAM

The Ministry of Health Malaysia encourages the study of the history and manuscript sources of Malay medicine and the development of their contents into therapeutic interventions.

The IIUM Flagship Health Information and Knowledge from Malay Medical Manuscripts (HIKAM) was established in 2019.

HIKAM's activities include:

- promote the value of Malay heritage treasures recorded in the old Malay manuscripts, particularly on the medical information
- education and training on the transliteration of the manuscript
- exhibition in various events
- establishment of MyGAHARU project and MyULAM garden at KAHS
- integration of the Malay Medical Manuscript (MMM) elements in the academic courses
- participation in the laboratory-based research and international conference.

HIKAM project leader, Assoc Prof Dr Mohd. Affendi Mohd Shafri was awarded the Anugerah Tokoh Harapan Akademik Bahasa Melayu by the Ministry of Higher Education.



Access to Justice for the Community

Through its flagship initiatives Access to Justice for the Community, the Ahmad Ibrahim Kulliyyah of Laws (AIKOL) has been actively promoting access to justice within the community. This commendable effort is achieved through the organisation of legal awareness activities and the provision of advisory services on a broad spectrum of legal issues affecting individuals and families in the community. This initiative primarily targets those who experience disadvantages due to factors such as limited education and literacy levels, financial constraints, and a lack of awareness regarding their rights and available avenues for advice or assistance.

Through this flagship project, the committee members consisting of IIUM lecturer and Student IIUM Legal Aid Club offering legal advisory services to individuals who are financially incapable of securing legal representation or accessing the court system. The primary beneficiaries of this initiative are Malaysians situated in the lower and middle-income brackets, as well as those within the more vulnerable sectors of society.

AIKOL also collaborates with local communities in a program called "Jalinan Mahabbah." This programme aims to make legal information more understandable and accessible while providing free legal consultations to the community.

In addition, the initiative includes a Clinical Legal Education course. This hands-on course allows students to learn through real-life practice by interacting with actual clients. This practical experience not only enhances their theoretical knowledge but also equips them with practical skills needed in the legal field.











Community-Based First Aid (CBFAA)



Historically, Community-Based First Aid (CBFA) was the principal method of reaching communities (International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, 2023). IFRC has mentioned that CBFA is one of its Global Agenda which aims to reduce the number of deaths, injuries and impact from diseases and public health emergencies. The IIUM Flagship 3.0: Community-Based First Aid (CBFA), which is based in IIUM Kuantan has a clear mission: to promote deep awareness and practical knowledge of first aid for both physical and psychological injuries.

Spearheaded by academic and staff members of the Kulliyyah of Nursing at IIUM, this project aims to empower communities to offer crucial first aid in emergency situations, bridging the gap until professional help arrives or patients can be transferred to healthcare facilities for further care. Among the programmes facilitated by the flagship to showcase comprehensive first aid practices was the "First Aid Demonstration," hosted during the Jamboree on The Air (JOTA) and Jamboree on The Internet (JOTI) 2023, which took place at the Kulliyyah of Pharmacy, IIUM Kuantan.

This collaborative educational activities was made feasible through the generous invitation and coordination efforts of the Kumpulan Latihan Kelanasiswa Malaysia (KLKM). The event attracted over 100 elementary and secondary school students, primarily from Pahang, along with enthusiastic participation from IIUM students.

The IIUM Flagship 3.0 CBFA also organised the "Kitchen First Aid" event at PDK Kompleks Penyayang. Collaborating with the Kulliyyah of Nursing and Kulliyyah of Dentistry, the program focused on teaching essential first aid skills using materials commonly found in a kitchen. Participants learned practical techniques like applying arm slings and bandages and handling bleeding. They also had hands-on practice sessions to improve their first aid abilities. This event showcased the initiative's dedication to empowering individuals with the knowledge to respond effectively to emergencies.




CBFA also collaborated with Sekolah Menengah Kebangsaan Bukit Goh (SMKBG), Kuantan, to organise an "Introduction to First Aid" programme, aimed to raise awareness about first aid among students. The programme focused on teaching essential first aid skills through informative presentations and engaging demonstrations. Students learned vital techniques such as CPR, the stop-to-bleed method, proper bandaging techniques, and general first aid practices. Practical hands-on activities were included to boost students' confidence in applying first aid in real-life situations. This collaborative effort between SMKBG and the CBFA team provided the Kulliyyah of Nursing students with broader understanding of health and safety awareness.

GREENING THE CAMPUS: IIUM'S MICROMOBILITY

IIUM has always been at the forefront with green-campus initiatives. For instance, in 2013, IIUM launched her Green-Campus Masterplan. In 2017, IIUM promoted the use of bicycles as a travel mode in Gombak campus.

Now, in 2024, as part of her Sustainable Ecosystem strategic initiative, the University implemented initiatives to encourage the IIUM students and the whole community to use bicycles and micromobility devices on campus.

Recently, the University has launched her micro-mobility programme on 12th June 2024 for a greener campus. This consists of the creation of micro-mobility priority lanes along the Al-Jami'ah Road in IIUM Gombak campus, centralised car parking facility and the introduction of electric shuttle services.

Sejahtera: A Local Concept of Sustainability [Sustainability at IIUM: Overview]

For IIUM, sustainability is not a borrowed agenda but one rooted in Malaysia's own intellectual and cultural traditions. The University has continued to strengthen its role in localising and contextualising sustainability through four interrelated concepts: Tawhidic Epistemology, Ummatic Excellence, MADANI, and Sejahtera.

During 2023-2024, these concepts shaped the way sustainability was understood and practiced across the University. Tawhidic Epistemology provided the foundation, ensuring that sustainability was viewed not in fragmented terms but as part of a unified purpose; to uphold balance, justice, and mercy in human–nature relations. This foundation supported Ummatic Excellence, which guided IIUM in producing graduates who combine faith, knowledge, and character, and who are able to serve as agents of sustainable development in society.

The framework of MADANI translated these ideals into action, embedding inclusiveness, accountability, and compassion into institutional life, community partnerships, and governance. Meanwhile, Sejahtera offered a distinctly local vocabulary for sustainability; one that emphasises harmony, well-being, and moderation in everyday practice.

These four concepts came together through IIUM's Communiversity approach, which positioned the University as both a centre of knowledge and a partner to society. By linking academic work with real-world needs, IIUM demonstrated that sustainability is not confined to classrooms or policies but is lived through education, research, community engagement, and institutional culture.

In this way, IIUM's sustainability journey reflects Malaysia's local contribution to global discourses: showing that sustainable development must be anchored not only in technical outcomes but also in values, identity, and a holistic vision of human well-being.

Teaching and Learning (Transformative Education)

Sejahtera Centre for Sustainability and Humanity plays a pivotal role in reorienting the curriculum towards sustainability, aligning with IIUM's strategic direction of Humanising Education. With a mission to integrate sustainable development principles into the educational framework, the unit focuses on empowering students with knowledge, values, and skills to address global challenges and contribute meaningfully to society. This mission is deeply rooted in the university's philosophy of Rahmatan Iil Alamin, ensuring education nurtures holistic individuals who promote justice, balance, and sustainability.

In line with this vision, Sejahtera Centre for Sustainability and Humanity has successfully introduced three innovative and compulsory courses under the UniCORE 2020 curriculum. Through these courses, students engage with real-world community issues, fostering experiential learning and meaningful contributions to sustainable development goals (SDGs).

This curriculum innovation exemplifies IIUM's commitment to producing balanced individuals equipped to lead sustainable futures.



The achievements of the Education for Sustainable Development efforts reflect IIUM's steadfast commitment to embedding sustainability into its core academic mission, seamlessly integrating learning, teaching, and research with impactful community engagement.

The Impact

Since its inception, Usrah in Action has accomplished remarkable milestones. Over five semesters, it has implemented 402 community engagement projects, directly involving 8,640 students and 277 voluntary instructors. These initiatives have positively impacted more than 6,000 local communities, making tangible contributions to societal well-being. The course's transformative impact is evident not only in the breadth of its outreach but also in its success in fostering meaningful partnerships, nurturing civic responsibility among students, and advancing IIUM's strategic aim of humanising education through sustainability-focused action.



A unique strength of Usrah in Action lies in its inherently multidisciplinary approach, fostering collaboration across diverse fields of expertise. Students enrolled in the course hail from various Kulliyyahs, bringing together perspectives from disciplines such as engineering, medicine, Islamic studies, economics, and more. This diversity creates a dynamic learning environment where knowledge and skills from different fields converge, enabling students to address complex community challenges with innovative and holistic solutions.

Similarly, the course benefits from the guidance of instructors representing multiple Kulliyyahs, who voluntarily contribute their time and expertise. This rich diversity among instructors further amplifies the course's impact, as students receive mentorship from experts with varied academic and professional backgrounds. Together, this transdisciplinary engagement cultivates a collaborative ethos, ensuring that projects are not only grounded in theoretical knowledge but also enriched by practical insights, cultural sensitivity, and sustainable development principles. Through this model, Usrah in Action exemplifies the power of interdisciplinary teamwork in creating meaningful societal impact.

LIVE DOCUMENTATION OF USRAH IN ACTION PROJECTS

A pivotal feature of the Usrah in Action initiative is the live mapping of community engagement projects, visualised through an interactive Google Earth platform. This dynamic map reflects over 400 student-led initiatives, categorised into diverse themes such as Education, Health & Wellbeing, Humanitarian, Entrepreneurship, and Environment. By showcasing the geographical spread and thematic focus of each project, the map provides a transparent, evolving record of IIUM's sustainable development contributions. Updated at the end of every semester, the map not only serves as a monitoring tool but also offers the public and stakeholders insights into the university's impactful outreach. The live map is accessible through the Sejahtera Centre's website, with a QR code available for direct access.





This role positions IIUM as a policy partner and reference point for sustainability in Malaysia, reinforcing its reputation as a university that not only educates and researches, but also informs and shapes the country's long-term development pathway. By contributing to such a critical national document, IIUM has demonstrated that its impact reaches far beyond campus boundaries, influencing the direction of sustainability at the highest levels of governance.

Achievement

International Green Gown Award 2024

IIUM's journey with the International Green Gown Awards (IGGA) began in 2020, when the university was honoured as the Sustainability Institution of the Year. This recognition, regarded as the highest accolade in sustainability within higher education, acknowledged IIUM's early efforts to embed sustainability across its governance, curriculum, operations, research, and community engagement.

Winning this award was more than a milestone; it set a global benchmark for IIUM as a leading Islamic university, demonstrating how education can be humanised through sustainability values rooted in rahmatan lil alamin.

Building Momentum (2021–2023)

After its 2020 breakthrough, IIUM continued to strengthen its initiatives, expanding projects and fostering broader participation across the university community.

- 2021: IIUM received commendation for the HyFlex Project under the Next Generation Learning & Skills category, showcasing adaptability and resilience in education delivery.
- 2022: Recognition followed for Community Action to Save Strays (CATSS@IIUM), highlighting student compassion and innovative responses to community issues under Benefiting Society.
- 2023: IIUM secured a major win with Trash to Treasure: A Journey Towards Zero Waste, demonstrating practical, student-led circular economy solutions. The YSM Agropreneurs Project, empowering youth and single mothers through sustainable agriculture, was also highly commended.

Each year, these recognitions reflected IIUM's growing ability to connect sustainability to real-world impact while strengthening its culture of transformative education.

2024: Scaling to Greater Heights

In 2024, IIUM once again reached a global pinnacle by reclaiming the title of Sustainability Institution of the Year. This reaffirmed the university's position as a global leader in sustainability in higher education, but more importantly, it reflected the deepening and widening of efforts since 2020. Beyond the institutional award, IIUM also achieved three additional category wins, demonstrating a broad spectrum of impact:

- Creating Impact (Winner): Nourishing Futures Malaysia's First Human Milk Bank Initiative, advancing health equity and compassion-driven innovation.
- Diversity, Equity & Inclusion in Sustainability (Winner): Breaking Barriers and Building Bridges, through disability-inclusive education and outreach (OKU4U Sejahtera & Islamic Outreach).
- Student Engagement (Winner): WikiKata, a student-driven project to preserve indigenous

languages, strengthening cultural sustainability and community empowerment. In addition, eight finalist projects showcased IIUM's diverse and community-anchored sustainability work; from smart farming to renewable energy and mental health support.

From 2020 to 2024: A Strengthened Legacy

The progression from 2020 to 2024 illustrates how IIUM has not only sustained but amplified its sustainability agenda. What began as recognition for embedding sustainability institution-wide has evolved into multi-dimensional excellence:

- Institutional Leadership: Twice crowned Sustainability Institution of the Year (2020 & 2024).
- Expanding Scope: From early focus on institutional frameworks to recognition of student-led, community-based, and inclusive projects.
- Global Relevance: Positioning IIUM as a bridge between Islamic values, national aspirations under the MADANI framework, and international sustainability goals (SDGs).

This journey highlights IIUM's unwavering commitment to Humanising Education; ensuring that knowledge, values, and skills contribute to holistic well-being, justice, and sustainability.

RCE GREATER GOMBAK

RCE is a network of formal, non-formal, and informal organisations that facilitate learning towards sustainable development in local and regional communities. A global network of RCEs constitutes the Global Learning Space for Sustainable Development. To date, 190 RCEs have been acknowledged globally by United Nations University Institute for the Advanced Study of Sustainability (UNU-IAS).

RCE Greater Gombak (RCEG2) was officially acknowledged on 1 April 2020 by the Global RCE Service Centre and the Ubuntu Committee of Peers for the RCEs. RCEG2 and its partners address sustainable development issues through the Whole Community Transformation (WCT) approach, elevating spirituality, and mainstreaming indigenous knowledge through tawhidic approach for ummatic excellence.

RCE members will meet annually at Regional and biannual for Global Conference. RCE Greater Gombak has successfully hosted the 14th Asia-Pacific RCE Regional Meeting (AP RCE Meeting) from 19 to 21 July 2022 and 13th Global RCE Conference from 31st October to 2nd November 2023 with the support of the United Nations University Institute for the Advanced Study of Sustainability (UNU-IAS).


